# **Course description**

### Theory and History of Culture

# 1. Course title, ECTS, quarter/semester, contact hours:

Theory and History of Culture, 6ECTS, 3 and 4 quarters, 44 contact hours: lectures (20 hours) and seminars (24 hours)

2. **Author of the course:** Marina Loskutova (Associate Professor, History Dept., Ph.D.)

#### 3. Outline:

Cultural history and theory are developing quickly as one of the most dynamic subfields in humanities. This course is intended to familiarize students with this rapidly expanding research domain. It will provide a broad overview of ways of doing cultural history from nineteenth century onwards, and at the same time will examine major periods in antiquity, medieval, early modern and modern history from cultural perspective. Due to the limitations of time, the course will explicitly focus on Russian and European culture, although certain phenomena will be further explored in their global dimensions. The course consists of two parts (1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> year of MA program). The first part of the course will cover medieval and early modern history with a particular emphasis on those issues that are not usually examined in standard courses on art and literary history: material culture, changing attitudes to time and space, history of emotions, the interaction between oral and literate culture, between popular beliefs and 'high' culture. Upon the successful completion of this part of the course the students will know working definitions of culture and cultural history and will be able to situate this field in its relationships with social and political history. They will be familiar with major cultural transformations from antiquity to the industrial era, and they will acquire basic skills in interpreting a broad variety of cultural phenomena in history.
