What are humanitarian standards?

People affected by disaster or conflict have the right to receive protection and assistance and to ensure the basic conditions for life with dignity. Humanitarian standards are statements which describe the sets of actions needed so that crisis-affected people can enjoy this right.

Humanitarian standards are developed by practitioners with specific areas of expertise - based on evidence, experience, and learning. They are used to plan, implement, and evaluate humanitarian response. The Sphere movement was started in 1997 by a group of humanitarian professionals aiming to improve the quality of humanitarian work: <u>https://spherestandards.org/about/</u>
